PRELUDE "O Come And Mourn" LS Quartet

O come and mourn with me while, O come ye to the Savior's side; O come together let us mourn; O Jesus, our Lord, is crucified. Have we no tears to shed for him, while soldiers scoff and foes deride? Ah, look how patiently he hangs; O Jesus, our Lord, is crucified. Seven times he spoke, seven words of love, And all three hours his silence cried for mercy on the souls of men; O Jesus, our lord, is crucified. O love of God, O sin of man! In this dread act your strength is tried, And victory remains with love, For he, our Lord, is crucified.

Due to somber nature of this Good Friday service, the service begins and ends with a pause for silence. Both before and after worship tonight, we refrain from conversation in solemn reverence and remembrance of our Lord's crucifixion. The dimlylighted worship space serves as a reminder of the awful consequence of sin and the darkness that feel upon the earth on the Friday when Jesus was crucified. "And it was the sixth hour, and there was darkness over all the earth until the ninth hour."

Tenebrae is a Latin word meaning shadow or darkness, and the service used tonight is sometimes called the "Service of Shadows." There are seven candles to correspond to the seven sayings Jesus spoke from the cross. The extinguishing of candles symbolizes the flight of the disciples, as well as the total submission of Jesus in suffering for the forgiveness and salvation of all humanity.

The removal of the eighth candle symbolizes the death of our Lord. The final darkness reminds us of Christ's stay in the tomb. However, the candle is not extinguished – as a reminder of the victory of God's love that occurs on Easter. We rest assured in the power of God to conquer even death and in God's grace for all through Jesus Christ, who is the Light of the World.

The loud closing of the book echoes Jesus' cry on the cross, "It is finished." The Bible is loudly closed to symbolize that in Jesus – his ministry, death, and resurrection – all the Scriptures find fulfillment. The Bible remains closed until the middle of the Easter Vigil service, when it is opened to proclaim the Good News of Jesus' Resurrection!

Pastor: Almighty and eternal God, you give strength to the weary and new courage to those who have lost



GOOD FRIDAY:

The Cross at the Center

At the center of Good Friday stands the cross. Even as the day's gospel opens with Jesus and his disciples in the garden, the cross stands in the background and looms larger with each passing moment: abandonment, betrayal, trial, humiliation, chanting crowds. Finally, the cross is flung aloft, bearing Jesus. Liturgically, many assemblies will find themselves today confronted with a cross at the visual center of their gathering, all the more apparent in a sparse and stripped sanctuary. In some places the cross will be made even more prominent through a procession or space for adoration of the cross.

In a world where we witness far too much senseless violence, some may wonder whether we should spend a day so focused on an instrument of torture and pain. Yet, the message of this day is not despair, but hope. "That which Christ has not assumed he has not healed," wrote St. Gregory of Nazianzus in the fourth century, "but that which is united to his Godhead is also saved." On this day, God comes in the person of Jesus Christ to assume the pain and suffering of our human existence. Here the cross draws into God's plan of salvation all the injustice, terror, anxiety, and death that we fear so much in our lives and our world.

So on this day, the church lifts high the cross as a symbol of the victory of God's love and proclaims the mystery of hope that through this cross, "it is finished" (John 19:30). All things that destroy the fullness of life are finished; all the work of salvation is finished. At the foot of the cross, you are invited to find your sin, your pain, and your fears folded into God's promise of salvation. On this day, you are invited to bring every part of you that longs for healing and hope and to place it with Christ on the cross, for that which he takes on he will surely heal.

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+ COMMEMORATIONS FOR TODAY +

Mikael Agricola, Bishop of Turku, died 1557

Consecrated bishop of Turku, Finland, without the approval of the pope, Agricola began a reform along Lutheran lines. In only three years, he translated the New Testament and worship texts into Finnish, in the process establishing the rules of Finnish writing that are still used today.
