is Jesus' parable about the judgement of the nations, where Jesus speaks of feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting the sick & imprisoned, welcoming the stranger—and says, "Inasmuch as you have done to the least of these who are members of my family, so you have done unto me!" Truly, God's Hope grows in the world whenever the Spirit empowers us to live out these words in so many ways.

The final words of Jesus shared by Matthew are those of the Great Commission (see above). Jesus commissions us, as his followers in the world, to go and make disciples. How does Jesus say to do this? **By doing two things: "baptizing" and "teaching."** It is a reminder of the central importance of Baptism in our lives! Baptism is the foundation of our relationship with God through Jesus; the holy moment when God acts to make a personal/communal covenant with us through total grace; the means of grace by which we are joined to Christ's death & resurrection; the miraculous gift by which we are made siblings of Jesus and members of Christ's holy community called the church; the wonder by which we are given the Holy Spirit to begin a daily hope-filled journey of dying to ourselves and being raised to new, ever-transforming life in Christ!

Being a student, a lifelong learner, is thus at the core of our identity as Christians .... our annual Faith Formation Kickoff invites all of us—adults, parents, youth, children, disciples of every age & stage of life—to embrace the centrality of lifelong faith education in our lives!

It is also a reminder of the **central role of "teaching" (and learning!) as part of God's growing hope in the world**. Remember that the most common title for Jesus in his ministry was that of "Rabbi" (or teacher). Remember that the word "disciple" actually means "student" of a Master. **Being a student, a lifelong learner, is thus at the core of our identity as Christians!** There are so many ministries we share as a congregation that help make the kingdom of God's Growing Hope a reality in our lives and in the world ... but lest we forget, a central ministry for all of us is that of teaching and learning. As society prepares for "back-to-school", so here too in August, as disciples of Jesus, we have our own "back-to-school" focus. Our annual Faith Formation Kickoff (aka "Rally Day") invites all of us—adults, parents, youth, children—to embrace the centrality of lifelong faith education in our lives.

To experience the wonder of God's Growing Hope, as followers of Jesus, we each immerse ourselves in Christ's ministries of service to the least of these among us in the world. As followers of Jesus, we engage in weekly worship to praise our God, remember our Baptismal identity, receive God's forgiving Word, and be fed with Christ's body & blood. But also, as followers of Jesus, we each embrace our lifelong identity as students of the Master!

I look forward to being with you on Faith Formation Kickoff Sunday (Aug. 20) - for all of us to "kickoff" a renewed time of learning in our lives, as disciples ... The next morning, we went to the Martin Luther King Jr. Center. We spent time in the museum, toured MLK's childhood home, saw where MLK and Coretta were laid to rest and saw the outside of the church where MLK pastored. After we finished at the King Center, we left Atlanta headed to Birmingham, Ala.











Once in Birmingham went to Walmart to purchase items to pack Blessing Bags for the next few days. We also met up with our adult group who were doing the civil Rights tour in reverse. We had dinner and lively conversations of our experiences careful not to tell the other of what was to come next in our perspective journeys. We concluded the day with a joint

worship experience and meal at Shepheard of the Hills Lutheran Church. It was humbling to hear from our youth and adults as they reflected.



The next day we all met up once more at the 16<sup>th</sup> Street Baptist Church. We sat, we listened, we looked, and we toured. This is the church where on September 15, 1963, the congregation of the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama greeted each other before the start of Sun-



day service. In the basement of the church, five young girls, two of them sisters, gathered in the ladies room in their best dresses, happily chatting about the first days of the new school year. It was Youth Day and excitement filled the air, they were going to take part in the Sunday adult service.

Just before 11 o'clock, instead of rising to begin prayers the congregation was knocked to the ground. As a bomb exploded under the steps of the church, they sought safety under the pews and shielded each other from falling debris. In the basement, **four little girls were killed**—14-year-olds Addie Mae Collins, Denise McNair, Carole Robertson, and 11-year-old Cynthia Wesley. Addie's sister Sarah survived but lost her right eye.

We processed our thoughts along the tour as we saw where the place where the bombing took place which was marked my a stone block of remembrance. Then we went to the Kelly Ingram Park across the street which was named in 1932 for local firefighter Osmond Kelly Ingram, who was the first sailor in the United States Navy to be killed in World War I. As we walked the park, we also engaged some of the homeless people and gave them blessing bags. After a while the adults and youth came together and shared in conversa-

tion how we were feeling after the tour of the church. Talk about powerful, and enlightening words of reflection from the adult and our youth, it is hard form me to explain. I hope can experience it through these words typed. After our time together, we prayed and departed ways, the adults



went on to tour the Birmingham civil Rights Institute and the youth continued our journey to Selma, Alabama.



Once we arrived in Selma, we drove by historic place where the Selma to Montgomery marches started, Brown Chapel A.M.E. Church. We shared with the youth as

we stood the Edmond Pettis Bridge that on Sunday morning March 7, 1965, despite a ban on protest marches by Governor George Wallace, about 600 black protestors gathered outside Brown Chapel to march from Sel-




ma to the state capital in Montgomery. At Edmund Pettus Bridge, six blocks from Brown Chapel, mounted troopers confronted the marchers and ordered them to disperse. The marchers stood their ground and the troopers advanced, billy clubs raised. People fell, their skulls fractured, a lot of them screamed while running, as

white onlookers cheered. There was firing tear gas and swinging bullwhips and rubber tubing wrapped in barbed wire. I let them know that was why it was called "Bloody Sunday." We then walked across the Edmond Pettis Bridge to the memorial just on the other side. Then we walked back across the bridge. It was a lot, it was hot, and it was knowledge.



We got back on the bus and continued our trip. I slowed the bus down and Leslie explained that these were the three of the four campsites where the walkers rested during the march to the State Capital. We stopped at the fourth campsite for the youth to see that it was the last stop before the final push to the State Capitol in Montgomery.

We took the route as best we could in a bus to the Capitol stopping at different markers along the way. Once at the Capitol of Alabama, we let the youth out and they walked to the top of the steps and gathered together sitting on the steps. It was a site to see them sitting in a place where the Civil Rights people who walked from Selma once sat.



From there were saw Dexter Avenue as we headed to our sister church, Messiah Lutheran. We ate and gave the youth time to download and process the day. A little later that evening around 9pm we had evening devotions and reflections.

The next day, Wednesday, July 12<sup>th</sup>, we got up ate breakfast which was provided by the church. We had an array of things from bacon to waffles, with juice and fruit. We were thankful for the breakfast which was served by the pastor and staff. After breakfast we started our day at the Rosa Parks Museum downtown Montgomery. Again, we sat, we

listened, we saw, we watched a rendition of that day when Rosa refused to give up her seat.

After we left the museum, we walked to the place where Rosa got on the bus. Along the way we witnessed just how bad the homeless population have it in the city as we saw a man passed out on the corner. There were already people there calling 911 so we went around them and prayed along the way for healing. For our youth we weren't just talking about the

homeless and passing out blessing bags, the reality of it was right there in our face to see. We were happy to know that the man did survive. It was severe heat exhaustion and dehydration which caused him to pass out. EMS took him to a nearby hospital. We thanked God for his survival and prayed for his health and for help.





It was a lot to take in and process. So, we toured the city for a bit before arriving at Davis Café for lunch. Davis Café has been around for a long time. It is noted that some of the civil right leaders, Rev. Jesse Jackson and the late Dr. Julian Bond, Congressman John Lewis and Rev. Joseph Lowery enjoyed meals and fellowship at the Davis Café when passing through. Congresswoman Terri Sewell is a regular. Let me just say that the food was soulfully delicious, and we all enjoyed it to the last bite. It was good to sit in a place and feel the love in the food.

After lunch we went to the Legacy Museum. I cannot put into words the depth of emotions felt during our four almost four-hour timespan. All I will say is this should be on a list of things to see and experience. As we left the museum there was silence on the bus

unless we saw a homeless person in need of a blessing bag.



Once we returned to the church we got food, ate and gave everyone a chance to process the day before evening devotion and communion.

On Thursday, July 13, 2023 we woke up to heavy rain and a cloudy day. We had breakfast, packed up our things, cleaned up our space, and chatted with the pastor and some staff before we left. As our day would have it, the rain continued as we headed to The National Memorial for Peace and Justice. Again, words cannot express the depth of



the experience. I will say that this is the nation's first memorial dedicated to the legacy of enslaved Black people, people terrorized by lynching, African Americans humiliated by racial segregation and Jim Crow, and people of color burdened with contemporary presumptions of guilt and police violence. You have to see it to experience it.

From there we headed to the Tucker Pecan Company where we were able to get stuff before we left Montgomery headed home. As we were leaving we were able to pass out more blessing bags to the homeless and those in need. What a way to end our time, being in service to someone else. We started our trip home with our last stop being a surprise. It was eating

experience. We stopped at Chick-fil-a's Truett's Luau in Fayetteville, Georgia. This place brings the spirit of Hawaii to right to you. In addition to Chick-fil-A classics, this specialty menu consists of everything from Island Chicken Salad sandwiches and I'a Makana Tacos to a Frosted Pineapple drink and Lava Cake. This was a good treat and a new experience for all of us.

The long trip home gave way to sleep for some and rest for others and driving for me. As we arrived home, we were met by parents who were glad to see us home safe. We unpacked, put away our things, and had a closing prayer circle where our youth shared two words as to how they felt. We then prayed out and left campus. This is a trip to remember. I hope that in your reading you were given a glimpse into our experiences. Thanks to everyone for your continued support for our youth and their experiences.

Following our Youth Mystery Trip, we had Graceworks (see page 10), and some of our youth participated in service to areas downtown. Now we can take a short breath as school starts for some, August 3<sup>rd</sup> and for others august 8<sup>th</sup>.

Through it all, let us remember that God is good all the time, and all the time God is good. Let's eagerly anticipate the ways God will continue to work as we sow new seeds of His Growing Hope.

I want to again express my heartfelt gratitude to each one of you. Your unwavering support for our youth and your continued prayers truly make a world of difference. Thank you from the bottom of my heart.

### Just us. Justice.

We aren't alone. As a body of believers, we are working together to "do Justice" as God commands in Micah 6:8. ...

Some are apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, and teachers <sup>12</sup> to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ...from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love. (Ephesians 4:12,16)

#### Just us. Justice.

As individuals and as the Church, we are never alone. God is with us.

And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age. (Matthew 28:20)

#### Just us. Justice.

Is it "just us"? Yes, each one of us is needed to be the hands and feet of Christ. We are it. And, no, as members of Living Springs it's not "just us" because we join almost 30 other congregations to work together for justice for our neighbors in need. And most importantly, it's not "just us" because God is always with us, going before us.

In late August, our new cycle for Justice Ministry begins with House Meetings where we talk about problems in the community that keep us awake at night. With hundreds of other people of faith in the Midlands, we then vote on a community problem to focus on this year. In the past 7 years we have worked for justice for those with mental illness, those without housing, those hurt by crime and violence, and those without food. In the coming fall and winter months we will explore ways to address these problems and in March we will ask our public officials for changes to make Columbia a better, more just place for everyone.

# Notes from: Worship & Music Ministry

#### The Wonder of Worship

This month we look at two important spoken elements of our Sunday morning worship services.



## **Lectionary Readings**



When I first starting coming to Living Springs, I was struck with how much Scripture was read every Sunday! I couldn't get over it! We are so blessed to hear three or four substantial public readings of God 's Word every single week, readings carefully selected to walk us as a faith family through the Bible every three years. If you grew up as a Lutheran Christian, you may not know that this is not the case in all churches.

A lectionary (Latin = lectio) is a list or book of Bible readings (or lections) to be read at church services. We and many other churches use the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL). I assumed it went way, way back, which is true, sort of. The reading of God's Word has always been at the heart of Judeo-Christian worship. Jesus, quoting Deuteronomy 8:3, said that we do not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God (Matt. 4:4). We are and always have been people of the Word, people of the Book. But our pattern for reading and hearing that Book, the RCL, was published in 1994 and is based on the Ordo Lectionem Missae (OLM), a ground-breaking, post-Vatican II lectionary published in 1969. Earlier lectionaries had relatively little organization, but OLM readings were aligned with the liturgical calendar and spaced across three years, each highlighting a particular gospel—Matthew, Mark, and Luke, with John interspersed throughout and used especially during Lent and Easter. See The Revised Common Lectionary.

Let's always be amazed and grateful to learn more about our great God! Let's listen with open hearts to receive the truth with gladness, with conviction when needed, and with determination to put the Word into action in our lives. (Remember that there are places in the world where having/reading a Bible can be dangerous.)



#### The Sermon



After the lectionary readings comes another blessing, and that is having someone who has steeped him- or herself in the weekly readings help us understand the meaning and significance of the passages. This feature of worship also stretches back to biblical times. At Living Springs we are blessed with two pastors who preach the Word powerfully from their hearts. They would feel about us the way the apostle Paul felt when he wrote

to the Thessalonian church: We also constantly give thanks to God for this, that when you received the word of God that you heard from us, you accepted it not as a human word but as what it really is, God's word, which is also at work in you believers. (1 Thess. 2:13). May the words of this chorus be our prayer each Sunday when we hear the Word explained:

> Lord, let my heart be good soil, open to the seed of your Word. Lord, let my heart be good soil, where love can grow and peace is understood. When my heart is hard, break the stone away. When my heart is cold, warm it with the day. When my heart is lost, lead me on your way. Lord, let my heart, Lord, let my heart, Lord, let my heart be good soil.

Join the fellowship and fun the second Saturday, August 12th, at 9:30 am. We are working on charity guilts:




